How Are Rights Best Protected?

- * A Code of Divinely Proclaimed Law
 - -Blackstone quote
- * Sound principles are based on natural or God's law
 - -God's supremacy
 - -Don't attribute creations to false gods
 - -Name of god held in reverence
 - -One day each week to be set aside for study of God's law
 - -Strengthen family ties by honoring parents
 - -Preserve sanctity of human life by not killing
 - -Strengthen marriage bonds by being loyal to spouse
 - -Preserve other right to property by not stealing
 - -Do not lie
 - -Do not lay schemes to get others things, earn your own.

Rights and Duties

- * With every right comes a duty
- * Two kinds of Duties:
 - -Public enforced by public laws (created by 'complaints')
 - -Private between individual and Creator
 - -Blackstone quote p. 133
