A Family-Centered Culture

- o deToqueville: (quote)
 - European family life:
 - Turbulence in society comes from home (problems)
 - Wants to forget troubled home life [so agitates while at work]
 - -American family life
 - marriage is respected
 - Home is a refuge from turmoil of society
 - Carries love of order from home into society
- 2. How are Men and women equal under God's Law? What did John Locke say to support this position? (282-83)

Equality of Men and Women

- o Biblical law of "differential equality"
- o Role of Man [as a king]
 - protect and provide
 - decision-making for the family
 - voted for the family
- o Role of Woman [as a queen]
 - Bring children into family
 - Strengthen the family environment
 - Nurture and teach children

Locke [p.283]

- o Scripture teaches equality (quote)
- *Paternal* authority should be called *parental* authority [that is, *both* should share] 3. HOW DID THE LIFESTYLE OF EARLY AMERICAN FAMILIES CONTRIBUTE TO THEIR SUCCESS? (283-84)
- o [Wallace Notestein: husband to honor his wife "with due regard." OT & NT commands
 - even to make financial compensation.]

Benjamin Franklin on Marriage

- 5. HOW DID FRANKLIN ATTEMPT TO PERSUADE A YOUNG FRIEND TO GET MARRIED? (285)
- o Counsel to friend wanting to take a mistress
 - Marriage is the proper remedy
 - A single man resembles an odd half of a pair of scissors

[Yes, he a great source for advice, and was not true he had 13 illegitimate children]

- 6. EXPLAIN WHY PARENTAL AUTHORITY IS BASED ON NATURAL LAW. (285-86)
- o Authority of parents over children is natural law concept (quote)
 - teach and care for 'till reason shall take its place'
- 7. ACCORDING TO LOCKE, WHAT IS THE MEANING OF MATURITY? (286-87)
- o When is one mature? (P 286)
 - when he knows the bounds of his actions by the law he is required to live under [- when a parent and a child are equally free under the law]
- 8. What is the responsibility of children to their parents? Does it have roots in natural law? (287)
- o Responsibility of children to parents:
 - perpetual obligation to honor
 - no state can absolve children of this duty
 - government must not interfere with parents
- 9. Why did Locke say that no government should interfere with legitimate family relations? (287-88)
- [o special aspect to honoring parents:
 - for children caring for their parents when they can't care for themselves]
